Examples include: "1906 Earthquake & Fire -- From South of Market to Union Square, explore how a massive earthquake toppled buildings, ripped apart city water pipes, and led to a fire that burned for 3 days." And: "Fisherman's Wharf: Learn about swimmers who survived (or didn't) the treacherous bay, the baseball great whose dad wanted him to be a fisherman, and what is underneath Aquatic Park." Please allow 3-4 weeks lead time to plan a group youth program tour.

Free to ages 15 and under, fee-based for older teens and adults: The Hyde Street Pier offers four permanently docked ships that visitors can tour. Allow two weeks' notice. Visitors can tour the *Balclutha*, an 1886 full-rigged ship; the *Eureka*, an 1890 San Francisco ferry; the *C.A. Thayer*, an 1895 lumber schooner; and the *Hercules*, a 1907 ocean tugboat – and admire the small craft and huge freighters plying the bay while soaking up the maritime atmosphere. Groups require a ratio of at least one adult per 10 children and youth.

Free: Youth Speaks offers fantastic no-fee spoken word activities for high schoolers and some for middle schoolers in July -- both workshops and spectator opportunities. This year, the annual Brave New Voices International Youth

Poetry Slam Festival – the world’s largest ongoing spoken-word event – happens in San Francisco the evening of Saturday, July 23, at the Opera House.

Events in connection with Brave New Voices offer enrichment and educational activities during the week of July 18-23. The Summer Learning Network will update members on details and schedules as early as possible.

The week of July 18 on a day to be announced, Youth Speaks will engage 500 high-school-age teens in free writing workshops at 10 branch libraries around San Francisco. On Thursday, July 21, young people are invited to a day of writing in San Francisco with Youth Speaks leaders from around the country.

Fee-based: Can arrange one-shot or longer-term session at the Mission Science site, for second grade and up. "Combines traditional activities in experimental sciences – use of microscopes, balances, thermometers, culturing plants and animals – with building a variety of projects with clay, wood, and plastic, including pendulums, electric and mechanical toys, musical instruments, and apparatuses that enhance our explorations of sound, light and color.
