NOTES: The LINC summer high school program is ideal for current high school students who are open to new experiences, eager to learn new skills, and enjoy working outside. No previous experience is necessary! During this six week intensive program, students assist with service projects, attend leadership workshops, and take field trips to extraordinary park sites, like Alcatraz Island, Muir Woods, and Mt. Tamalpais. Projects and activities include trail work, plant propagation, and habitat restoration. Students also focus on team-building and exploration during a four-day camping. In addition, students will get an opportunity to learn more about ecology and science. Program is physically demanding and participants must be able to commit to the entire six week period without scheduling conflicts. Upon completion, students receive an educational award of \$1000.

NOTES: The foundation of Aim High is an intensive, engaging and challenging five-week summer school program for middle school students from low-income families. Students join after 5th or 6th grade, and participate for three or four consecutive summers. Students graduate from Aim High in the summer prior to their freshman year in high school. Aim High works in close partnership with the Golden Gate National Recreation Area (GGNRA), the Exploratorium, as well as partner schools, school districts, and universities. Middle school is a crucial juncture in making a difference in young people's lives and the purpose of Aim High is to reach students at this critical crossroads and propel them towards success in high school and college. Research has shown that sustained intervention during the middle school years goes a long way to keeping students engaged in their education, resulting in lower high school drop-out rates and higher rates of college matriculation. Learn more about our results and what makes Aim High so special. Aim High's summer school program operates a 5-week summer program, Monday through Friday, from 8am to 3pm. Key components and practices of the Aim High Summer Program design support our outcomes for youth.

The Garden Project's mission is to empower young adults through environmentally based job training and life skills programming, while transforming the urban environment. The program offers: Paid, on the job training: Garden Project Earth Stewards Apprentices work in an intensive program, learning organic horticulture and landscaping skills. Plants grown by Apprentices are used on our city streets and in our parks. The Project donates all organic vegetables grown by program to local food pantries. Currently, 35 pantries ranging from Project Open Hand to the San Francisco Housing Authority, receive donations weekly.
