Update and future announcement of the holiday meeting.

PRESENTATIONS

1. Edgewood, Family Resource Center – David Rages, Program Manager for Kinship THP+, and DR programs, Jacqueline Lumpkins, Family Support Supervisor – speaking about Edgewood’s community based programs, which are centered around family support services. Jacqueline and David introduced themselves and begun their Presentation. Edgewood has different sites and the programs here in the FRC in Bayview Plaza are Kinship Support Services for families where a child in their family is not their own immediate family, but a family member or former foster child; Support groups, monthly workshops, family advocacy, all Edgewood families have access to all their programs. They also are focused on caregivers. Regarding the TTH plus program, it provides housing support for young adults in the foster system and helps them with saving account, transportation; it’s for ages 21-25 and have been in foster care. Child abuse response support services including case management. How many FRC’s in SF? There are 26 throughout SF, in the Bayview, we are one of three, BYMCA, Edgewood and the new MNC. All are family focused through support and training for parents. Provide community events for families and offer a component of education along with celebration. Parent Cafe’s, a program collaborating with Tandem who host and collaborate so they can hold their food bank distribution and cooking classes. They have a parent advisory committee, Innovate schools have a staff that support services at the Café’s, and there is a mother’s group and father’s group, hosting a Fatherhood Conference with community partners. Child development activities and help promote early literacy, working with Bayview Library, ASQ’s which is an assessment tool to assess child hood development skills. Child development specialist on their team, to provide support for all their families and programs. Have a supply closet for families and babies, basic needs; the items are donated so the inventory varies. Cooking class and food box on Thursdays. City graze at their events for the kids. Summer field trips and outings during the year. Information and referral services. In January 18 they will have enhanced visitation for families with those visitation needs. They are leaving collateral and their news letter for everyone and their power point and collateral will be included in the minutes.

2. SF Dept. Of Public Health – Vincent Fuqua, Program Coordinator – Black African American Health Initiative - Part 1 – Vincent is here, offer part 1 of his presentation on the BAAHI - Good afternoon from Vincent, he has been at SFDPH 25 years now, this is a new project for him; he began with an overview History of the four areas that they are centering on to address and improve health outcomes in this community; they are Heart Health, Behavioral Health, Women’s Health, and Sexual Health. Recently supporting work groups and addressing cultural humility and workforce development - transforming work that is done here in SF by

starting within our own departments. He also provided information on the BAAHI Structure and a staff update. One thing they are looking at is making sure the work is a trauma informed approach, to pay attention how race affects work, perception and let that lead on how to work with people. Asking what happened to you instead of what's wrong with you. Trying to shift how things used to be done. Why? Significantly worse in the SF community and the AA community historically and to this day experiences trauma. Looking at social conditions. BAA Mortality, exceptionally high in SF for this community. Need to work with the community. Brief map displayed. Next slide 1940's history, in the Fillmore 40's was popular 50-60's is when redevelopment started happening for the community. 60's racism was very prevalent and then to 80's the mass incarceration problem spiked. These are the stories and history that have impacted our community. The social determinates of health, the root cause and casualties. Addressing the beliefs and the living factors are some of the root causes of the structure and belief system the community has. This is a consequence, poor health. How is BAAHI addressing equity? Looking within DPH and external by looking at the community. How are we taking action on the training that is being provided. Peer leadership, BYMCA and Rafiki are the programs DPH is working with to address these concerns of BAAHI. Vincent overseeing that work, looking at different ways such as Food Pharmacies, Food Bank, Healthy Hearts; Dr. Bennett would like them to be in the community more. What can we do? Teach racism is traumatic and how to address that and call that out. See close, three points of BAAHI, collaborate and look for ways to support. Will be back in January for part 2, and with some statistics. He mentioned the work with the Bayview YMCA and their upcoming events that are part of the community work. 3. HOPE SF – Saidah Leatutufu, MPA Economic Mobility Director – She introduced herself and passed around a copy of her the ppt, she explained how HOPE SF provides support and resources with dept. partners and ensures resources are effective and viable, and prioritizes advancing policies to help the community advance economically. The presentation she shares is a high-level overview of Hope SF which includes their theory of change and presents a graphic on the plan. She refers to a Seven corner study leading their work; it showed that the main concerns were in public housing. Led to HOPE SF as the reparations and transformation effort to reduce poverty, create vibrant equitable communities without community displacement. Able to redevelopment in stages to help retain tenants, 4 Public Housing sites. Potrero, AG, DR Sunnyvale and hunters point. Community of over 5000, intentional in breaking down the isolation of the public housing communities. Even by landscape, they are isolated. A CI initiative. A public private partnership, sf foundation, philanthropic funds and led by MONS. Principles are results based accountability; use data to advance and address work, 2nd is that they are resident led and driven, 3rd, trusting community collaboration, leverage relationships with community partners who are on the ground. Invest in our partners how they do the work, at the core is the people and serving the people. Finally public systems transformation for or the families. Around the needs and desires of the families. structure/communities, Community leadership and finally trauma informed family systems working with the health and wellness centers and educational pathways. Not making new promises, but fulfilling old ones. Many communities are not able to access economic growth. Creating an inclusive mix of affordable units, no loss of public housing, market rates, 3rd and 3rd. High quality property management is in place. Advancing community development, the secret sauce is the four-pronged approach. Marques Grey, familiar with the neighborhood, formerly with BMAGIC, is the HOPE SF Director of Community Leadership. He spoke of the community history and historically, these communities have been some of the worst. Our hope is to bring transformation and HOPE SF is committed to be here to make sure the community is aware and has access to the resources and takes advantage of the resources for youth leadership. McCormick Barry Management is the property manager at Double Rock. Hunter's View just achieved 100% in retention/community moving back-in, 67% of people moved back to Hunters View, they had the choice to stay where they were moved, no market rates are built yet phase 3 is coming available soon. The Alice Griffith renovation should be completed by 2020. Talked about their priority of having the community moving back in during the reconstruction and development as the project continues. COMMUNITY BUILDING

1. New Door Ventures – Shane Maldonado, Youth Development Specialist, Leila Vega, Outreach Coordinator, Jesse Ostroff, AmeriCorps VISTA Program Outreach Coordinator - introductions - Leila, Jesse and Shane - workforce development and serve a huge population from the Bayview, working with ages 16-24, show a quick video, overview instead we own two enterprises and graphic tee printing and pedal revolution, their youth work in the business and also work with other organizations and businesses in the Bayview. Expanding opportunities for young people and have been able to include more services. The screening process for a business is a month or longer, they vet the business to house the intern. New door pays the internal and the business offers the mentorship and experience. These are opportunities for the work, 12-15 hours per week at the job sites. Intensive work with the youth, includes a two week orientation/work force training. helping they build skills before their internship. Offer paid weekly job training, interview, resume and other job skills. Flyers going around, if a youth wants to connect, they come to a meeting, every Tuesday or Thursday. Shane talks about their in-house HS test prep for GED and is on a rolling basis, and can come to process at anytime. First is to attend the information session. Receive transportation support and is only two hours a day. Up to 24 turning to 25. Pay for their test and support the day of. Help them be prepared and accompany them. After the three months, what attrition and success looks like. Our goal is to place them in employment or education and or both. Youth can come back if they need support with housing or education. They are committed to help the youth find long-term employment, have a 92% rate, work on resume along the way. In the last three weeks is

interviewing and job finding, resume building and mock interviews for example. Will be able to follow and connect with HOPE SF directly. After 3 months, the employer sometimes keeps a young person, but the goal is job experience and can go to a permanent job. After three months it ends. Can't mention workplaces but can share the areas of work. For confidentiality can't name specific. Card being passed around, can come and do a presentation at a site and for youth, to hear first hand what they do. MLK Playground – Community Presentation – Marien Coss, SF Rec. & Parks - architect and project manager, worked on Hilltop, here to provide an update on Bayview Park, MLK Pool and the update on the project funding. Able to provide project update, started by showing the photographs and renderings for the construction. Talked about the challenges and the history of the project and the funding and additional grants that had to come together to complete the project. Break ground next year, maybe June. Talked about the original ask from Heal Zone and parks 94124, and the adjustments and work around once the project plans were being drawn up. Since 2014, then to now have added additional fundings and were able to double the award for the park, includes swing sets and the complications to add new equipment.
