THEME: A Look at the New Year

#### INTRODUCTIONS

-Welcome, housekeeping and overview of the agenda – BMAGIC presented the agenda with updates and let the conveners introduce themselves.

#### **PRESENTATIONS**

Condinator - Cannabis Legalization – Max Gara and Cyndy Comeford, Dept. of Public Health Office of Policy and Planning are here today to present the Health Impact Assessment Report on SF Cannabis Legalization. A Health Impact Assessment looks at the target, the methodology, and considers data and community input. The first stage of policy assessment is the screening stage. The legalization task force has been working for several years, supplementing the process of the Health and Equity stage of assessment. It is in their scope to report to the communities that provided input. Prop 64 passed last November and legalized adult use cannabis. Medical cannabis has been around already while recreational adult use is new. The Health Impact of Cannabis use is our community is not well known. This report is meant to provide input moving forward for the City and County of San Francisco and expresses the need to proceed with caution. Cannabis use is not risk-free and the City and County would like to see how to minimalize any potential health risks. They would also like to minimize any potential harm to the community and to prevent renormalization of tobacco use. Two special points, Scoping health pathway diagram potential health outcomes Assessment and framework Area, population, prioritize the impacts and Assessment methods, looked at baseline, existing use rate and the medical cannabis dispensary

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system. They reviewed literature that has documented health impacts. Key informative use and engaged in discussion to have a wide range of people that deal with cannabis. There was a short timeline to gather a lot of information for the board's recommendation, on how to legalize cannabis is San Francisco. The findings included a the first part, the youth use of cannabis, and a look at the baseline of use in Middle school and High school, the SF rates remained stable and were overall below the national rates. Rates in the SFUSD were about the same or below of the national average, after stratifying the data, they observed different data, certain populations have a higher rate than at a national level for some minority and low income communities. However, hospitalizations and emergency room visits were looked at and as a cocontributing factor. ER visits have increased, and hospitalizations, up to 45% and data for AA youth showed they were affected higher than all residents were overall. Thought the concern is increasing, it is still a very small CD and Green zone distribution. Further analysis of the findings and research is telling, in that the medical cannabis dispensaries are not distributed evenly, some are neighborhood heavy, following the same patterns as alcohol and tobacco retailers. Areas around dispensaries have higher minority populations. Qualitative analysis including key informant interviews and youth focus groups, 11 key local informants and from 6 different jurisdictions that already experienced legalization. The main concern, it's already widely available and seemed as natural. Concern students aren't getting the information they need, with regards to dispensaries, we hope that the effort is to bring more information to what cannabis is to our youth and all concerned. Cross cutting to the key findings, there are three main findings. 1. Disproportionate Health Impacts, 2. Concern about edibles and 3. Youth normalization, with all the advertising. Based on the evidence there are 6 Recommendations 1. When to make the implementation (slow roll out important) 2. Public Health education campaign for all demographics 3. Education in programming 4. Disproportionate outcomes and they need to be addressed 5. Looking at community context is important 6. Start to develop some standards around advertising, where possible want to work with the industry to do self-regulation, Questions about the report and the implementation, and human development based on the frequency and a request and need for a specific AA community impact of cannabis were determined. ### **COMMUNITY BUILDING**

1. Picture Bayview - Imprint City – Tyra Fennell, CEO and Founder - Tyra is here today to talk about Imprint City, Bayview Live and the co-partnership and collaboration of Zaccho Dance Studio and Imprint City to bring Picture Bayview. She explains that Imprint City works Citywide, but is primarily focused on

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the Bayview Hunters Point Neighborhood and in particular, Egbert. Their mission is to go into industrial and underutilized areas with arts, music and events to help re-activate area. The Bayview Live festival started in partnership with Laughing Monk Brewery. Another goal and working project is turning Bayview into a designated cultural district, where the arts can thrive and funding can be available for projects more readily. She mentioned that their series of concerts at Zuckerberg General Hospital are starting again on February 15<sup>th</sup>, kicking off with Kat Wilder.

Bayview Live Festival - Oct 20, 2018 with plans to activate the area with live and large scale murals, helped and created by youth and worked by youth. Local businesses are invited to participate. There will be a Techmobile bus too. The Picture Bayview project in partnership with Zaccho Dance will be producing is a month long program to culminate at the event. Contact Tyra to participate. Tyra further explained about how to make our Bayview a Cultural District for art it will help the artists and urban arts. Trying to organize our community to see what that means to us. Imprint City is spearheading the project, it will further inform us as to what an art district looks like, this project is co-authored by Malia Cohen, D10 Supervisor. 2. Shoreline View Park – Paulina Araica, SF Rec & Park Project Manager - SHORELINE VIEW PAEK, PAULINA - rec and park project manager for capital division. In July, the Shore View Park and the capital improvements efforts began, they need to see how the communities can work together to bring a primary park to be used by residents nearby and along Ingalls Avenue. The park was built in 1979 with concrete play structures and walks around retaining walls. Since it was abandoned, SF Rec & Park have had to fix it, to get it in usable condition in the meantime. During that time were able to begin the planning project. The project has a budget of 1 million plus that is already approved, from that looking into ways for the community to help decide what to do and improve the park. Started in October and had a workshop in November but not that many attended. So embarked in heavy community outreach to let the community know that it's (the park) for everyone here in the Bayview, it's sister park to Hilltop Park, need your input and support to move forward. A playground, bbg grills, park as an area for families to enjoy the park, fun and challenging activities for the children all come from the initial community input. From there, they settled on 2 concept designs, they will be shown this Saturday at one of the final community input meetings. Come support the Parks 94124 at the Bayview Health Center 1-2:30 pm on LaSalle to look at the designs and provide input. Final meeting in March for approval of the concept plan with the support of the community. Has to spend the money and add different grants to supplement the money and funds already designated. Paulina is requesting support and hopes to see us this Saturday. Any comments, please contact her. Any other ways/grants let her know Laurel with Habitat for Humanity is holding park cleanups at the Shore View Park on 1/27/18. Question about the funding, it's with SF Rec & Prk, explained phase 1 and phase 2. All the design and part of the construction, the funding is there, please come on January 20th to provide more input and discuss the plan.

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#### PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT

1. Bayview Hunters Point 2017 Organizational Assets & Needs Landscape Analysis -Lyslynn presents our presentation, explained the history and the past two reports. Still processing the final report, and there were 42 agencies and they received their copy, 70% are in the Bayview 6 city and 6 schools rounded out the respondents. Regarding Shared spaces -Lyslynn shared the meeting spaces under CBO toolbox, there is a list and how to access them. Some are referral from BMAGIC only. Youth Services – we asked what types, and saw there are a lot of volunteer opportunities, paid and unpaid internships for youth, no big changes around types of services. Many programs geared towards mentoring. Targeted youth services and the results of what is being provided. Majority working with youth and the TAY Workshops are being provided for youth, job readiness, healthy relationships, arts and media, not changed to much Organization capacity Language, strategic plans, workshops and trainings, increase in orgs to provide Spanish, and Chinese and Samoan, moving along with the Bayview trend. Transportation –we asked if agencies are providing transportation for their organizations clients, and 25% say yes. Most of the assistance were muni passes and tokens, some Uber and lyft, Bayview moves were mentioned. We then asked about grant writing and consultants, most have some type of grant writer, no team building, development plans and 68% has some kind of development plan in place, CBO Programming - David had some input about the shuttle service they are doing, will our data help guide or point to position resources to make this bigger for the community. Trainings and workshops for service providers Youth development, violence prevention, mirrored the youth workshops

Challenges 1-10, 12 challenges, reviewed the categories and the ratings. Communication, retention, evaluation and assessment, funding Community support and participation BMAGIC resources and services Lyslynn reviewed the categories and the top things/services we provide are the calendar, Resource Guide and Conveners Meeting with the Back to School event being the most attended. Talked about workshops and our referral protocol is a valuable tool for organizations to adapt and use. BMAGIC has the tools in place, but can be better about reminding people about things we have worked on and can provide. During the break, we sat down and did programs services with the RBA approach, and analyzed and applied it to our services. Enhance our CBO workshops and bring back out CBO workshop series, make sure we have workshops you are all interested in and you are eligible as DCYF grantee, to compliment and enhance and make it neighborhood specific. Networking, how we can provide a platform for that and provide networking events for the community. We are working on a series.
