## PRESENTATIONS

**1. EcoCenter & Greenager Update - Brenda Cartagena, Program Coordinator, SF Recreation & Parks** - Brenda is here today to share about the Eco Center and SF Recreation and Parks Department, and the formal change of stewardship at Heron's Head Park. Anne Marie of Bay.org shared the transition and history. The Eco Center and Bay.org the EcoTarium have been there since 2014, and have worked with a lot of partners in the community since the opening. Some highlights have been their student education program for the environment including the event, Baysplash. For the past 5 years, the Eco Center have partnered with the SFRPD, and SFRPD plans to continue with it as a hub for community education, keeping the intent and honor the spirit and work of the Eco Center. SFRPD finalized the agreement March 1 and extended partnership to provide programs for the park, the programs will continue, system tours and will also be coming in with their own programs, managing wetlands, clean ups and revitalization with youth and adults, and the youth stewardship program Greenager internship for the Bayview, Southeast and Northeast sectors of the city. SFRPD proposes to enter a 9-year agreement with the SF Port Commission to operate and provide programming at the EcoCenter in Heron's Head Park. The EcoCenter is an off-the-grid sustainable building, habitat for native plants, birds and butterflies and an educational community center for youth and adults. SFRPD has been providing free public programs on behalf of the Port of San Francisco since 2010. The Youth Stewardship Program and the Greenager Program started with a pilot class in 2013 and have had cohorts up to today. The Youth Development collaborations include Jewish Vocational Services (JVS) and Wilderness Arts Literacy Collaborative. They have organized and led Volunteer Workdays and other cleanup events. They offer Recreation and Leisure programs including trail walks. RPD has provided schools and community members with opportunities to steward the land at Heron's Head Park for an average of 3200 hrs of service a year, RPD has served over 9000 youth and adults through Projects at Heron's Head Park, has facilitated over

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80000 total hours of service since 2010 and estimate an increase by 2% in stewardship alone within our first year. So RPD agrees to continue to provide existing RPD Programs at the park, will increase public access hours and open the facility from Wed-Sun from 9:30am-3:30pm, will continue to provide drop in EcoCenter tours to inquiring visitors during public access hours, will facilitate and keep many of the same and comparable youth education programs that Bay.org implemented during their tenancy, and continue to work with community stakeholders to develop programming and events that benefit the community and park. Lastly, RPD will designate 3 staff to offer customer service, engagement and quality programs accessible to the community. If there is any interest in collaborating come find Brenda, open to collaborating and learning more about what is going on. They are introducing 4 new programs and activities the first year, including Sunday Trail Public Engagement Ambassador Program, Intercept Surveys to get a baseline on park user's level of engagement and connection, a new recurring workday arrangement serving the Juvenile Probation Enrichment Program and summer camp hosted Tuesdays and Thursdays June 17-August 2 by agreement with CBO's, Joe Lee is one of the partners. She shared their Strategic Plan Objectives, Inspire Space, Inspire Play, Inspire Investment and Inspire Stewardship. The slides attached have more detail. The Greenager program application date has been extended to 4/20/19. They hope to hire 11th and 10th graders without experience, for the students it is more of a program than a job. The incentive is furthered by offering excursions, along with the work. ## **2. Family Wealth Forum - Nicole Agbayani, Office of the Assessor - [Event Link](#)**

Nicole is here to talk about the Assessor's office signature event, the upcoming Family Wealth Forum. The assessor's office is a quieter side and the revenue side of government in City Hall. They manage and assess taxable property in the city, she shared the General Fund revenue and split between Bart, Air Quality and Education. The Family Wealth Forum started in 2017, they have held 5 events since then. They created the event to address community questions, people were lacking guidance and found that by offering a one-stop shop to answer community questions for the families would be a great benefit and service. They offer a unique area of housing and tax information not out there right now; they are the only office offering this service. The Family Wealth Forum since its first event in 2017 has connected over 1000 families with services and information. Two key features of the event is the service offerings. By reservation a family/individual can access 1-1 counseling, with the BAR association and a CPA, regarding financial planning. We are excited to be able to offer the service for families, we will provide planners, a series of educational workshops including information on what to know after inheriting family home, inheriting a home with debt, and home repair. They have a pretty robust agenda, working with contractors as well offering some tips. The date is Saturday May

## COMMUNITY BUILDING

### 1. SF Bike Coalition - Bayview Community Bike Builds - Jo Anne Burgess, Program Coordinator

– Joanne introduced herself and is new at the SF Bike Coalition. She manages their Community Bike Build Program, and provides the service for the city ordinance to refurbish and redistribute the recovered bikes to communities after the city delivers the bikes to their refurbishing facility here in Bayview. The SF Bike Coalition hosts their Bike Builds on the 2nd and 3rd Wednesdays of the month, Joanne, along with volunteers refurbish them and then distributes them back to community. She is doing outreach and is asking for more partnerships with organizations, she shared some events coming next week. She shared they just hosted a build with Friends of the Urban Forest at their office, then they took the trees around with bikes and trailers to plant them. With more participation even more teenagers will be able to receive a bike; they have to go through a safety class with information on urban safety as a heavy focus. After that they will receive a helmet, lock and lights, they want to make sure if someone gets a bike they can keep it for a long time, hoping to have them understand how to lock up their bike and the resources around the city for maintenance and upkeep. She shared that the Bike Kitchen does offer free repairs for anyone under 18, they will work with someone too. She shared one of the big events is one with BMAGIC, last year over the summer, the SF Bike Coalition and volunteers refurbished and distributed 60 bikes at the Backpack Giveaway. They have spoken with D10 Supervisor Walton and he expressed being interested in coming to a Bike Build. She also shared their upcoming Learn to Ride event, with biking and promoting adult and family Learn to Ride at NOW Hunters Point on Saturday April 20th. Also coming up is Bike to School/Work day, you can ride by yourself or with your kids. Come out and celebrate biking on May 9<sup>th</sup>, Joanne is leading one ride near city hall. ### 2. Connect SF Presentation - SF Tech Week in the Bayview - Yuet (Liza) Ly, Bayview Librarian -

Julia and Liza, May 5 to May 11, all across San Francisco, connect to tech week, free classes and a guide booklet of what and where they are going on. Coming up at the Bayview branch, teens can record music, their own song, another workshop on Internet for Seniors, will have Spanish speakers, online support for job seeking, help with Linked in profiles are among some. The Highlight is the Tech Expo, held Tuesday May 7th at City Hall, which is a Tech Conference for Non Techies. You can enter a drawing, or have cookies, they are trying to make it more interactive and step it up even more with some virtual reality testing with XBOX. Liza is the our teen librarian at the Bayview branch, she shared a valuable workshop on how to send an

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receive digital images, how to scan and turn documents to digital documents able to be saved using cloud based services. They also will be able to give out limited numbers of USB Storage devices. On May 7th they are hosting a Coding Club from 5pm-8pm with Nadia Wallace. There are limited laptops available at the Bayview Branch for the Tech Fair. On Saturday May 11th, K-12 Students can learn how to make a computer, learn how to code, find tech support, enter into a tech exchange for those with low income for low cost internet at 10\$. Giving away about 150 desktops, and 150 IOU's for computers when they come available later. Flyers in Spanish and Chinese. ### **3. MLK Park & Pool/Bayview Playground Updates - Marien Coss, Project Manager**

Marien is the Project manager for the MLK Reconstruction work, she has been here a few times to do the community outreach for updates and input about the reconstruction plans. MLK Park is made up of three amenities, being a pool, a playground, and a ball field. The history is that about 5 years ago, community lobbied to win the Community Opportunity Fund to refurbish the playground. As the plan developed, they also heard from community that wanted to create a walking path around the property, with pockets of adult exercise equipment; that additional funding is from a federal grant and was stuck in administration up until a few months ago. They decided that they wanted to keep the ball field but also how to create the area for a community lawn, so the design was switched reversing the placement of the infield and the outfield. The playground will actually be nestled by fencing and the walkway will pass it. The walking path is a five loop mile. She showed the entrances on the new renditions. There will be uniform new fencing, different than the mix of different fencing from past repairs. Reminder about the equipment approved is a jungle gym and swings, it was important for community to include swings and adult exercise equipment, they plan to spread them out to see your kids while you use the equipment. The breakdown of the costs, total costs, was going to be double but the grants helped. The Project schedule is to start construction at the end of the year/beginning of the year. She also shared RPD has heard about safety concerns and unusable restrooms, so they have had a park and bathroom monitor during the day along with a vigilant gardener and report a big change in loitering since then.
