PRESENTATIONS

1. **Parents for Public Schools - Greg Bailey, Program Director** - PPS - Greg is here today to speak about PPS and is happy to share. He has been there for over a year, prior was working in Oakland doing restorative practice programs and restitution. PPS are committed to the success of every public school. We advocate for all schools. Mission - we promote the fundamental value of public education and pursue the success of every public school by sharing knowledge, bridging communities and informing policy. Our thing is to make it simple, to make the best choice for your child. Our Ambassadors are for new parents, to help orientate them at their new school. We also have a policy rep. that attends SFUSD meetings to share information and to educate parents on policy changes. Our Executive Director is Teresa, and she has been with us for about 2 years. PPSSF seeks to pursue the success of every public school with their enrollment program. They have over 100 enrollment workers and serve approximately 3500 families. They serve a

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population that has 30% language use other than english, 40% of those served are in the Southeast neighborhood. They provide over 500 one on one coaching sessions and trained over 320 educators and community leaders and still counting. They use email and We-Chat to engage parents, able to answer questions quickly. They have a huge multilingual community online. PPS has over 250 parent ambassadors and works with parents and inform policies to engage in decision making, they work with AAPAC for policy and information as well. During SFUSD public board meetings, they have a rep. that tweets coverage of school meetings. After gathering all the information, they present their findings to the school board, along with all the parents concerns and from all our members. All of us, here at PPSSF are here to help and the way we do it is using our platform. please help fund PPS SF and their support for Public Schools. Q - Parent Ambassadors have their website and you can email them especially around enrollment, Q - School choice? - who to contact, contact Greg for next steps, via our website, we are connected to EPC Educational Placement Center. They work with the enrollment process, when parents have issues, we advise them on advocating on their school of choice. If interested, can do a workshop with you at their site. You can use their website to set up a workshop. Coleman asks Q would like to have an SSC, looking for support for a school site council at Bret Harte, it's a way for parents to advocate for their children at the specific site to address issues. It's an elected body of parents. Outside of enrollment Q, need a response for the parent if school engagement is hard for a parent, Greg at PPS can help find the answers if not can help find someone who can, they advocate for parents, don't want to pass the buck and promise to see it through till the end, do it daily. Q5 - what is the process for SSC, district rules say you would need one admin, a family engagement person, sometimes a student and the parent, and it is a governing process. Any parent with a child in the school can be part of the meeting. Can always sit on the SSC meeting. For more information contact Greg Bailey at greg@ppssf.org and office 415-861-7077

2. **Emotional Emancipation Circle - Daisy Ozim, Resilient Wellness** - Daisy of Resilient Wellness is here today to talk about their work with SFUSD and the community. Their mission is to support the transformation of communities and systems impacted by intergenerational trauma with innovative solutions. Daisy went on to share the support offered: Emotional Emancipation Circles, Trauma and Workforce Development, Ambassador Certification, Health Education, Integrative Analytics, and Technical Assistance. Help with systems, health education, help with holistic services, allow community to access, Resilient Wellness. They offer a Holistic non western approach and will help in the development of a self evaluation tool for schools to assess themselves and seek recommendations. Their Integrative Data Analytics promote understanding of intergenerational trauma as causative factor for chronic illness. HHealth Education provides health education rooted in the lived experience of communities we serve in order to improve knowledge of factors that influence health and empower individuals to take charge of their health. Their Ambassador Program provides training certification programs that enhance service providers knowledge of alternative solutions for clients experiencing trauma. Their Holistic Health Services is their online platform that allows for individuals experiencing chronic illness or seeking preventive services to easily book the care they need. The Technical Assistance they provide supports institutions and organizations with the following: program development; project management; curriculum development; evaluation and reports; and research support. Working with Lincoln on their culture climate, on their Trauma Score, and the school has to self select their own scores. Collaborative would love to have Daisy back when there is more data. What is the training? you would get hands on training,

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question what are some of the herbs and foods that can be prescribed to transform trauma and other healing tools for community? To get training and if you would like to host for you and staff, contact Daisy. One for staff at their agency, can maybe do one for community. Title 4E funding provides for training for foster care providers. Also working with the California Children's Trust, their redesign in 2020 for the Medicaid. COMMUNITY BUILDING

1. **Safe Passages and Safe Routes to School - Bayview Plan - Joanna Sullivan & Greg Moore, Safe Passage Senior Manager** - Safe Routes to School - Bayview Work - Community engagement for schools, started out of concern of parents for safety in their neighborhood for their children and families. It was successful and now they are trying to foster and create an effort in Bayview and South of Market. Have some success in SOMA with having corner captains. While starting their work here in the Bayview, they realize it's a whole new neighborhood and approach. They have been convening and building community in Bayview with community stakeholders and existing city resources, taking what is already out there and working. Would like to make existing support better. Walk and Roll To School had some success last year and the other is the Safe Routes to School work which is more about walking, biking, public transportation, car sharing. Both just joined The Safe Routes program within SFMTA now. They started about 1.5 years ago to find the needs in the community and are concerned with Equity here in the Bayview. They are working with Chris Kidd now, mapping work with youth at the schools here in Bayview. They hosted workshops with SVIP, MTAP, CTA, MTA, Bike Collation, Walk SF and had a strong ask from community. Working now on more of a safety presence, more MTAP on the routes. SFMTA is set to increase the 44, create new bus stop stations already. They would like more partners and see as a youth led initiative, would like to see more safety on the streets. Lately there has been a quick turnover of parent champions for the work but continue the work with youth and interested parties. Walk SF, walk and roll to school day is coming closer, and it's a way to provide outreach and visibility to the program. It's October 2nd. Q - What type of partners you are looking for?...they report having attended some meetings, with SFPD. Q - What are the gaps, who are missing? parents and community members, and youth needed to participate more, have their voices heard. passed around a sign in sheet to partner and learn more about the work. Vernon, has been working with schools and parents. Always looking for more parent champions, please contact Vernon. Ms Wade Thompson comments that safety used to be only elementary school issues that needed solutions. For safety, they shifted scope with a strong focus on the streets and safety on routes to school, and crossing guards. Communication is key, the Convener meetings are key, and helped get started an environmental safety team. Some community suggestions for more participation, maybe convene closer to central Bayview? Talk about open positions and positions that have to be filled it's a ranking system for crossing guards, need to fill certain spots first in the line. Ms Wade Thompson shares a concern, and that a parent has a video about the concern. There have been a lot of accidents and now a concern on ride sharing. Who can I go to for help, the safety person for students. Persons at schools and community can call the MTAP if they see them out, they wear green vests. They should be more visible, not to confuse with fare checkers, MTAP now down to 12 employees for the whole city. .. FYI Students can get free muni at MTA, easy online application. Sharing - Students report being nervous because of ticketing cause of the vest color confusion. Joanna and Greg thank everyone, please contact them at joanna@tlcbd.org and greg@tlcbd.org
