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PRESENTATIONS

1. African American Arts & Cultural District - Ebon Glenn, Operations Director - Ebon is here to share today, his second meeting and happy to be here. Just joined staff in the last few months. AAACD is the only AA District in SF along with 8 different ones. Their District Corridor is Bayview and the Landmark is 3rd St. He shared their Mission statement. Their main work is to identify certain areas of weakness and give recommendations to the Mayor's office to revitalize our neighborhoods in addition to capacity building to those AA owned businesses and neighborhoods. In areas such as economic growth and sustainability to cultural art

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programming, and support businesses and administer grants. He shared their Vision statement How they and shared more on the CD's work. Their work with the city depts support is key to their success. He and other CD's work with the Office of OEWD to build capacity in their designated neighborhoods they serve. Seek to activate 3rd St. more and make it more inviting. also work with HRC to collect data. and support from D10 Sup. Walton's Office. Every CD has 7 areas of stabilization to keep the communities and neighborhoods strong. They are looking to work with other people in the neighborhood, all towards the efforts to avoid marginalization and demigration in these neighborhoods. Shares about the steering committee, which direct the activities. Fiscal agent is YCD in the Bayview. Shared banner rendering which have been installed, and one of their activations with SF Black Wall Street . Right now with the restrictions in place, they are supporting the community with pop-ups. BHVP is an AA corridor, exemplified in the banners posted from Sam Jordan's way to Jamestown. History of Bayview was that 70% of African Americans resided in the Bayview while today the population is 33%. For addressing demigration, they are putting a lot of awareness and programs to avoid demigration. revitalize and support the african american businesses. Questions - Cultural heritage and economic stability/CHES report. LysLynn had some questions about their data and their public meetings. Action items include townhalls to get more community input. They are having meetings while also working on their contact database, they also do have a website in development to be updated by the end of the month. 2. Walk SF - Ally Geller, Vision Zero Engagement Manager- Aly, Vision Zero Engagement Manager, is here today to share and introduce Alvin Lester, Families for Safe Streets, and thanked Vernon for the introduction. Alvin is an Advocate for Families for Safe Streets, he is one of the founding members. Their group is mobilizing and advocating to mitigate and eliminate car violence. Alvin shared his history, his son was struck and killed as a pedestrian here in the Bayview. A year later others similarly affected formed their advocacy group, Families for Safe Streets. Focus to raise awareness to the issue and move policy proposals to legislation. Shared some photos of their advocacy work, fatality dropped from 27 to 14 that year, showing marked improvements. Need more sustainable solutions. He shared posters from their World Day of Remembrance activities. He shared photos of accident victim survivors and those that have passed. Says this violence is too common while it doesn't need to be, working hard to change these outcomes. shares statistics slide. shared more history and why the work needs to be done. Shared that reducing speed advocacy changes takes a lot of hard work. Shared more advocates, and parent survivors. Norman Yee is a strong advocate and funding support. Shared more ways to press for change with media coverage and other advocacy and activism efforts. Shared a shoe memorial to honor victims. David Chiu joined them, it was an important day to get issues front and center. Vernon shared that he collaborates with Walk SF to help impact the speed reduction work too. Slower streets mean safer streets. Fatality rate, at 20 mile an hour, as speed goes up, chance of surviving gets lower. They advocate for a speed limit with pedestrians reduced to 20 mph. What asking for support means, simple affordable solutions,

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paint and markings, she shared a pedestrian safety zone as an example and a bulb out, forces the car to turn more slowly. People traveling are fallible, but with planning and safety, we can eliminate situations. Shared members activities and their advocacy. SF general has taken care of many of the survivors and the City has to take on cost for many of them and their expenses in recovery. Every victim is offered resources and comfort. Shared a map of most fatalities and where they occur. Shared some work in other countries and their achievement of zero fatalities from car and traffic. 3. Bayview Transportation and Community Shuttle Update & Quick Build Mural Project - Chris Kidd, SFMTA Bayview CBTP Transportation Planner - quick updates on the shuttle and a quick build project. Chris, thanked everyone, he worked previously on the CBTP, and is here to provide updates on work in the Bayview. Some work already being done are crosswalk restriping on streets around Palou and Gilman, at some point next year, three different quick build projects will also come online. HuntersPoint Blvd, one at Innes, and another on Williams Ave. from Phelps to 3rd St. Coming later with more bus shelters and display signs with new accurate arrival signs, a series of community build outs and some staffing for transit assistance and safety personnel. Shuttle update - direct recommendation, had identified a grant, applied but did not win the grant, but are committed to help make this service happen. Would like to find more clarification to find potential funding sources to bring this service to the community. Express bus - the 15x is coming soon. He shared more about the other quick builds, covid threw things for a loop and set us back. I had to get back online and had a meeting and another public hearing is coming up on December 4th, sharing a proposed design to share with the community and decide on a design. Looking to February for the installation; it would be a lane reduction along HP Blvd, Jennings to Hawes St, installing concrete barriers. would create a physical protected space for walking and bicyclists, lower driver speeds and limit maneuverability, would help deter sideshows in that area too. Less exposure. In conjunction, will be a community mural project for these k rail barriers. We want the community to be reflected and represented, doing mural artwork across the k rail barriers. Having a sponsorship with Spin, makes it easier to get the project going. I establish community based organization and industry partnerships in career readiness and exploration opportunities for underrepresented students in middle schools and high schools across the district.
